Two Bomb Aimers attended Link instruction. Ross (G111), Base Station Commander, regarding commission.</p> <p>(8) Duties are heavy in the Orderly Room at this time due to numerous monthly returns being prepared.</p> <p>(9) Squadron Leader Higgins and Flight Lieutenant McLeod departed, late in the afternoon, to visit the Night Vision Centre at Towcester.</p>		
	2nd Feb.		<p>(1) One aircraft completed an air-to-air firing exercise with drogue aircraft from Dalton. Three aircraft completed air-to-sea firing exercises.</p> <p>(2) Pilots practiced S.B.A. and Bomb and Aimers and Wireless Operators practiced "Homing" on Gee. Gunnery on local ground and flying training. Bomb Aimers received instruction on Boulton Paul Turrets and map reading, and remainder practiced Bombing and Gee.</p> <p>(3) Two crews from the Squadron - Pilots, Flight Lieutenant C.G. GROFT	29 & 30 2nd Feb. (cont'd)		<p>Leader Seabourne, 6 Group Air-Borne Rescue Officer, was in attendance, and gave a constructive lecture to the crews. He also took part in the water exercises. Flight Lieutenant T.R. Walker (21869), Squadron Adjutant, attended, and gave instruction to several beginners. Group Captain R.M. Hibbert (AFO) 21066, Station Commander, was an interested spectator. All in all, this weekly flying drill is most useful and helpful to all concerned.</p> <p>(1) Two aircraft, in conjunction with one aircraft from No. 450 Squadron, participated in a large night cross-country exercise. "Beech" flares and T.I. Maxims (one red and one green) were dropped at two turning points over the nose. Navigators were instructed not to use Gee on the two red lamps, but to navigate on R.R. and Astro. Due to clouds, R.R. was not visible, though the "Beech" flares were seen by several crews. On the second leg, the T.I. was not seen, but two crews were able to obtain traces of the "Beech" flares. The poor results on the second leg were attributed to the sudden drop in wind velocity which caused most navigators, however, this training is invaluable to Navigation, and also to "spare" crews, who get an opportunity to see what our own flares are like. For this reason, an effort is being made to obtain a supply of all types of markers.</p> <p>Two aircraft completed air-to-air firing exercises.</p> <p>(2) Navigators, not on cross-country, on Gee training and Astro. Gunnery on spotlight target training, and Bombs Aimer practising: incendiary and Gee. Five Bombs Aimers had Link instruction.</p> <p>(3) 1135223 Flight Sergeant A.J. McNaught and 1135229 Flight Sergeant J.K. Curtefson and crew proceeded on leave to-day.</p> <p>(4) Flying Officer H.W. Appleton (1700), 1 Mobile Relations Officer from Leeming, paid a call to the Squadron.</p> <p>(5) Pay Parade held for the Squadron in No. 2 Barracks at 0830 hours. Flying Officer W.J. Jones (142452), who was reported missing from operations on November 25th, 1943, and escaped from France, returned to the unit to-day on a visit. Timouth and crew - after an exciting trip, being attacked by night fighters, rendering u/s all Wireless Equipment, & Rear Turbine, and damaging the Starboard wheel flap, fin and rudder. On top of this, the inter-communication system was out of order. 1801820 Sgt. R.G. Warren, the Engineer, was injured slightly by a piece of shrapnel in his thigh. The Rear Gunner, E1234/25 Sgt. W.J. Watson, had his hands, ears and feet blistered from freezing, and was admitted to Marshalltown Hospital on return. The crew's co-operation was outstanding in spite of these difficulties. P/B Timouth made a successful landing here at 0052 hours on 16.2.44.</p> <p>None of our aircraft were missing, but the remainder were all diverted - nine to H.S.A.A.F. Station, Whelling, where the crews spent three days awaiting favourable weather before returning. Living conditions were, as in most dimensions, somewhat uncomfortable, but this state of affairs was dwarfed by the many social American friends who did all they could to make the boys feel at home. Meals at Whelling were really tops, a delicious item being canned fruit with gravy, meat, and passable coffee. Everyone saw the B-24 Liberator, and S/L Dow and P/O Craig (RAAF) had a short flight in the mighty ship. Most other American Pilots were greatly impressed by our ability to land at night, and cannot believe how simple it really is.</p> <p>One aircraft landed at Wittering, and another at Upwood.</p>
